EDITORIAL – 2025:

TURNING HOPE INTO ACTION ACROSS UGANDA

In 2025, the Uganda Women's Cancer Support Organization (UWOCASO) reaffirmed its mission to deliver dignified, compassionate cancer care. Through strategic partnerships, community based programs, and relentless advocacy, UWOCASO has transformed lives, empowered survivors, and built resilient networks that bridge gaps between medical treatment and everyday realities.

A YEAR OF HOLISTIC IMPACT

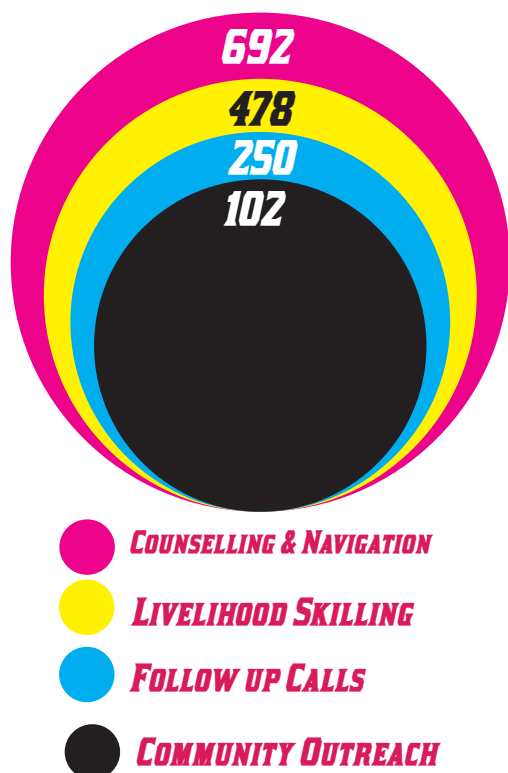
COUNSELLING & NAVIGATION – 692 patients received one on one and group counselling, complemented by 133 home visits. Survivor counsellors played a pivotal role in fostering treatment adherence and combating stigma.

LIVELIHOOD SKILLING – 478 patients and caretakers acquired practical skills (beadwork, tailoring, crafts). The initiative not only generated income for transport and daily needs but also bolstered confidence and social cohesion.

FOLLOW UP CALLS – 102 phone follow ups ensured continuous guidance, reducing drop outs and reinforcing a sense of security.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH – Over 250 home visits across Gulu, Kampala, and the UWOCASO office engaged families, raised awareness, and cultivated supportive environments.

HOLISTIC IMPACT



OVERCOMING CHALLENGES

- **Road & Telecom Barriers:** Early deployments and pre discharge scheduling mitigated access issues.
- **financial Constraints:** Negotiated treatment waivers; mammography vouchers, mobilised food, household items, and transport assistance.

AMPLIFYING VOICES

Weekly radio programmes (e.g., Radio Pacis Gulu, Mama FM, CBS FM and), hospital meetings, and vibrant social media storytelling projected survivor narratives nationwide, fostering empathy and action.

SIGNATURE INITIATIVES

ABLE+ Project – Women Component: Integrated counselling, navigation, and skilling, restoring dignity and resilience for hundreds of women.





MALAIKA PROJECT: Trained 20 survivors and 10 volunteers for peer counselling; supported 150+ patients with transport, food, investigations, and education subsidies.

MOVE FOR HER – PUBLIC DANCE WORKOUT (31.Oct.2025): Reached 1,487 participants, screened 156 individuals, and sensitised 254 community members on benefits of HPV vaccination, physical exercise and regular screening in cancer prevention and early detection

QUARTERLY PSYCHOSOCIAL GROUP THERAPY: Offered counselling, income generating activities, and self care services, empowering participants across Uganda, Western Kenya, Southern Sudan, and the DRC.

STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT: All activities align with WHO's 90-70-90 cervical cancer elimination targets, WHO 60:60:80 Global Breast Cancer Initiatives goals and Sustainable Development Goal 3, advancing vaccination, high performance screening, and timely treatment toward a cancer free future.

CALL TO ACTION

UWOCASO invites partners, donors, and community leaders to sustain and expand these life changing programs— whether by funding skilling initiatives, supporting psychosocial groups, or amplifying survivor stories. Together, we can transform hope into measurable impact and ensure that no cancer patient walks the journey alone.

BRINGING HOPE AND SKILLS TO WOMEN FACING CANCER

Uganda Women's Cancer Support Organization (UWOCASO), in partnership with Oncology for Africa (AfAON), the Uganda Cancer Institute (UCI) and St. Mary's Hospital Lacor, has continued to stand with women and families affected by cancer through the ABLC+ Project Women Component.

From January to December 2025, the project reached hundreds of patients in Kampala and Gulu, providing not only counselling and navigation support but also life-changing skills that restore dignity, resilience, and hope.

HEALING THROUGH COUNSELLING

692 patients supported through one-on-one counselling, group sessions, and 133 home visits. Survivors-turned-counsellors encouraged patients to adhere and complete treatment, fight stigma, and strengthen emotional resilience.

SKILLING FOR RESILIENCE

Recognizing financial strain as a barrier to treatment adherence, UWOCASO launched a skilling program at UCI home care:

- 478 patients and caretakers gained practical skills in beadwork, tailoring, crafts, and more.
- Products are sold to visitors, helping patients meet transport and daily needs.
- Beyond income, the program-built confidence, social connections, and mental well-being.



STAYING CONNECTED THROUGH CALLS

102 follow-up calls supported patients with treatment guidance, emotional support, and referrals. Calls reduced dropouts from care and ensured patients felt secure and connected.

TAKING CARE TO COMMUNITIES

78 (66- f & 12- M) home visits across villages in Gulu reached 165 caregivers and families; 55 (47- f & 8-M) home visits in Kampala and 57 (55-f & 2- M) home visits at UWOCASO office. Visits raised awareness about cancer care, reduced stigma, and encouraged family support.

FACING CHALLENGES, FINDING SOLUTIONS

- Poor road networks Teams set off early to reach patients.
- Telecom barriers Appointments scheduled before discharges.
- financial hurdles UWOCASO negotiated treatment waivers, mammography vouchers and mobilized extra resources including food and household items
- Charity Shop: finding market for hand made products by survivors

AMPLIFYING VOICES

The project gained visibility through:

- Weekly radio talk shows (Radio Pacis Gulu, Mama FM and CBS FM).
- Hospital meetings and community events.
- Active social media storytelling to showcase impact.

As UWOCASO celebrates 15 years of partnership with AFRON, the ABLE+ Project Women Component reminds us that cancer care is not just about medicine— it's about restoring hope, dignity, and resilience. Together, we move closer to achieving health and well-being for all (SDG 3)

CANCER SURVIVORS AND PATIENTS RECLAIM HOPE THROUGH SHARING AND EMPOWERMENT

For many, the moment a doctor confirms a cancer diagnosis is terrifying and overwhelming—not just for patients, but also for their loved ones. The fear of cancer, often seen as a death sentence or even contagious, can leave families feeling helpless. Recognizing this, Faith Equals Works INC (Uganda Mission Project) from the USA and AIRD-Uganda joined hands with UWOCASO to create a supportive and safe space for survivors, patients, and caregivers to come together, share their journeys, and find hope.

This initiative is one of UWOCASO's Quarterly Psycho-Social Group Therapy, provides a platform for one-on-one counselling, experience sharing, and celebration of the resilience and strength of each participant. Beyond emotional support, the sessions focus on practical empowerment, including small-scale income-generating activities, beauty and self-care services like manicures and pedicures, and key discussions on nutrition, treatment side effects, and economic empowerment.

One inspiring speaker, Ms. Doreen Kabasomi, a breast cancer survivor who underwent a double mastectomy, encouraged attendees to pursue home-based businesses as a form of economic empowerment. She shared her personal journey, explaining that starting with as little as UGX 50,000, she was able to support her children's education and build her own home through sewing. Her story sparked vibrant discussion among participants, many of whom shared their own initiatives—from making fresh juices from local produce to raising poultry—and sought guidance on expanding their ventures.

The meeting brought together patients from all four regions of Uganda, as well as from Western Kenya, Southern Sudan, and the DRC, highlighting the urgent need to improve access to comprehensive cancer care in the region. These interactions underscored an important insight: for many patients and survivors, sustaining a livelihood is central to living a quality life, particularly for those who are breadwinners for their families. UWOCASO plays a critical role in supporting these individuals, offering training, mentorship, and start-up capital to help them thrive.



Through these group therapy sessions, cancer patients, survivors, and their families regain hope, courage, and adherence to treatment, enabling them to live positively and productive during survivorship. The stories of pain, resilience, and victory shared in these gatherings illustrate the profound impact of UWOCASO's mission: engaging communities, providing essential knowledge, and building social and economic capacity to support families navigating the challenges of cancer care



MALAIKA PROJECT – ANGELS BRINGING HOPE TO CANCER PATIENTS

With the generous support of AIRD and partners, the Uganda Women's Cancer Support Organization (UWOCASO) implemented the Malaika Project to improve the psychosocial, emotional, and economic well-being of cancer patients and survivors in Uganda.

THE SUPPORT MADE POSSIBLE:

STRENGTHENED COMMUNITY-BASED CANCER CARE: Trained 20 cancer survivors and 10 community volunteers to provide peer counselling, patient navigation, and psychosocial support

Built survivor leadership and confidence to support newly diagnosed patients within their communities

IMPROVED ACCESS TO CARE AND TREATMENT ADHERENCE: Provided home-based counselling and follow-up support in Kampala and Wakiso

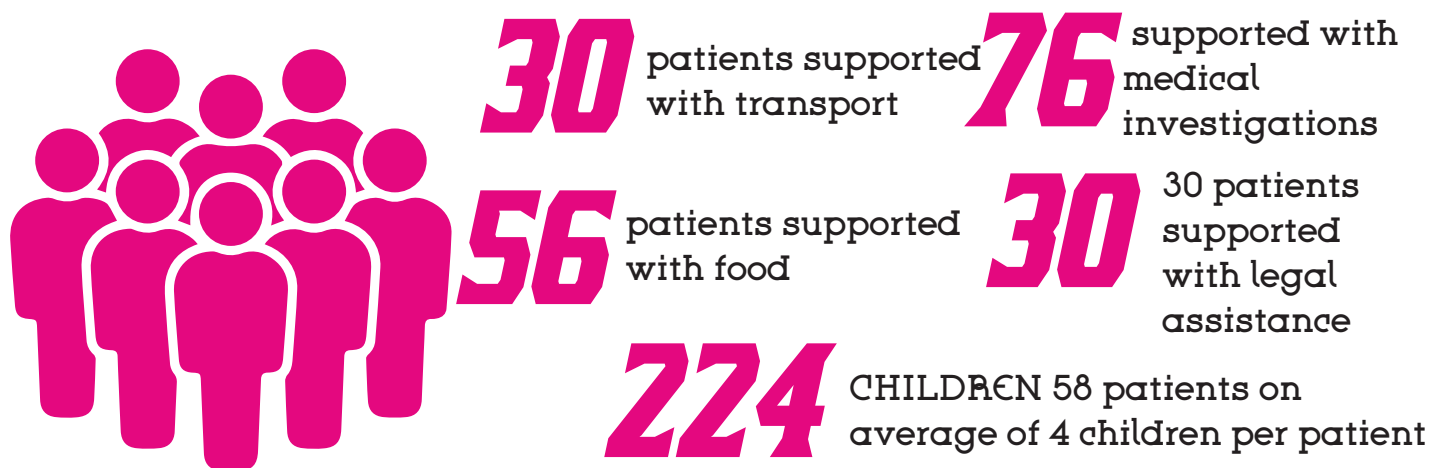
Addressed stigma, misinformation, and fear, enabling patients to better understand their diagnosis and continue treatment



TIMELY RELIEF FOR PATIENTS AND FAMILIES:

Responded to 150+ patient requests for urgent needs whereby over 30 patients supported with transport, 56 supported with food, 76 supported with medical investigations, medicines, 30 patients supported with legal assistance and 224 children for 58 patients on average of 4 children per patient supported with school fees.

SUSTAINABLE, SURVIVOR-LED IMPACT: former beneficiaries transitioned into active supporters, strengthening a sustainable cycle of hope and community ownership

Improved emotional resilience among patients, caregivers, and families

OVERALL OUTCOME: Donor investment in the Malaika Project contributed to improved treatment adherence, reduced stigma, strengthened psychosocial support systems, and increased community engagement in cancer care.

This partnership continues to ensure that no cancer patient walks the journey alone. Together, we are restoring dignity, strengthening families, and delivering hope where it is needed most.



OCTOBER BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Every year, UWOCASO joins the rest of the world to commemorate October Breast cancer awareness month through various activities to create awareness about Breast cancer in Uganda. October marks a pivotal month for UWOCASO, uniting education, early detection, and community engagement to combat cancer across Uganda.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

COLLABORATION WITH THE BUGANDA KINGDOM AND COMMUNITY HEALTH AND INFORMATION NETWORK (CHAIN),

conducted a medical camp in Busukuma Sub County to commemorate Buganda's Independence Day, delivering targeted cancer awareness talks, the importance of HPV vaccination and regular screening in cervical and breast cancer prevention and early detection.

CORPORATE AWARENESS INITIATIVES:

Engaged SGA Security Ltd, Vivo Energy, Kampala Capital City Authority, and senior officers of the Uganda Police force during bespoke sessions, fostering a health conscious culture among professionals and their teams.

EMPOWERING VOICES:

MOVING FOR LIFE: “Move for Her : On 31 October 2025,

UWOCASO successfully hosted the 4th Edition of the Breast Cancer Awareness Public Dance Workout, themed Move for Her, at Hockey Grounds in Lugogo as a climax for October Breast Cancer Month 2025. The event brought together communities, partners, survivors, and leaders in a vibrant show of solidarity demonstrating that movement, awareness, and early action can save lives.

Blending energetic dance workouts with cancer education, free screening, counseling, survivor testimonies, and yoga for mental well-being, the event transformed a public space into a platform for prevention, hope, and dignity. The initiative emphasized physical exercise as a key preventive measure, while promoting early screening and timely treatment critical in a country where breast cancer remains a leading cause of cancer-related deaths among women.

The event was graced by Owek. Cotilda Nakate Kikomeko, Minister of Social Services, Office of the Nabagereka of Buganda Kingdom, as Chief Guest, and supported by youth champions from All Eyes on Us foundation. Participation cut across government and private institutions, Buganda Kingdom officials, national authorities, civil society organizations, and members of the public.

Beyond the numbers, the event strengthened networks and partnerships, leading to tangible follow-up support such as mammography vouchers for women with suspicious findings. Survivor testimonies played a powerful role in reducing stigma, encouraging more

LOOKING AHEAD: Breast cancer in Uganda is increasing at an alarming rate, yet it remains preventable and highly treatable when detected early.

Building on the success of Move for Her, UWOCASO and its partners will intensify community awareness, follow up on referred cases, provide counselling to patients and families, and continue advocating for accessible, affordable cancer care closer to the people.



UWOCASO SHINES SPOTLIGHT ON SURVIVORSHIP AT 5TH UGANDA CANCER CONFERENCE

Kampala, Uganda – September 12, 2025: The 5th Uganda Conference on Cancer and Palliative Care brought together experts, policymakers, and survivor advocates under the theme *Embracing Uniqueness and Empowering Communities*. The focus Survivorship— helping cancer survivors navigate life beyond treatment with dignity, mental well-being, and social support.

UWOCASO proudly shared initiatives that make a real impact:

- Training Village Health Teams and Survivors to improve breast cancer referrals.
- Mentally Cancer-free Project, empowering women in Mende, Wakiso, with psychosocial and economic support to boost mental health and treatment adherence.

Survivors called for a dedicated Survivorship Clinic at Uganda Cancer Institute to enhance surveillance, follow-up care and reduce recurrence. The conference also emphasized community reintegration, evidence-based care planning, and tackling stigma

UWOCASO PARTICIPATES IN THE 15TH AORTIC CONFERENCE IN HAMMAMET TUNISIA

Uganda Women s Cancer Support Organisation (UWOCASO) participated in the 15th African Organisation for Research and Training in Cancer (AORTIC 2025) Conference held from November 2–5, 2025 in Hammamet, Tunisia. Convened under the theme **Advancing Cancer Care across Africa: Equity through Empowering Research and Education**, the conference brought together over 1,000 participants from across Africa and the world to share scientific insights, strengthen partnerships, and explore innovations that can advance cancer care in Africa.

UWOCASO contributed to the scientific programme through a panel discussion along aside oncologists and advocates from USA, Ghana, Zambia, Kenya and Uganda sharing their experiences and perspectives on accelerating access to newer medicines in Africa. Supported by Medicines Patent Pool (MPP) in Geneva,

The discussion highlighted possibilities and challenges of procuring newer medicines as domestic fund allocation, cost effectiveness for African budgets, possibilities of diagnosing patients to be able to benefit from newer medicines and the readiness, capacity and availability of infrastructure to use newer medicines in Africa

IMMEDIATE RESULTS

- 2,500+ attendees engaged and informed.
- Increased awareness of women's health and cancer prevention.
- Connected communities with UWOCASO services for follow-up and support.

KEY FOCUS: NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

The campaign addresses rising NCDs, including cancer, diabetes, and heart disease. Prince David Kintu Wasajja called on men across Buganda to prioritize their health, particularly through prostate cancer screening, contributing to stronger, healthier communities.

Event Highlights

- **INTERACTIVE BOOTHS:** Attendees learned about cancer prevention, self-examinations, and received survivor testimonies.
- **COMMUNITY DIALOGUE:** Local leaders and residents discussed health challenges and built supportive networks.
- **PARTNER NETWORKING:** UWOCASO engaged potential collaborators for future health projects, like the Home of Hope initiative.

LOOKING AHEAD

UWOCASO plans to follow up on suspicious cases, strengthen partnerships with Kabaka and Nabagereka foundations, and expand outreach for ongoing health education, HPV vaccination for girls and screenings.



WOMEN'S DAY CELEBRATION: EMPOWERING WOMEN THROUGH CANCER AWARENESS

On March 8, 2025, UWOCASO celebrated International Women's Day with a Cancer Awareness Campaign at St. Jude Catholic Parish, Wakiso, under the theme Empowering Women through Cancer Awareness.

The event brought together 400 women for talks, workshops, and inspiring survivor stories, focusing on:

- **Prevention and Early detection:** Breast and cervical cancer signs, HPV vaccination and self-checks.
- **Healthy living:** Nutrition, exercise, and managing treatment side effects.
- **Mental health support:** Coping strategies and community networks.

Community leaders joined in fostering dialogue and support, while attendees shared positive feedback about the valuable information and welcoming environment.

Next step:

UWOCASO will follow-up workshops at church services, partner with women leaders to promote HPV vaccination, screening, and create year-round outreach programs to keep cancer awareness strong. UWOCASO remains committed to empowering women, promoting health, and supporting those affected by cancer in our communities.

WORLD CANCER DAY 2025: STRENGTHENING CANCER AWARENESS IN UGANDA

In Honor of World Cancer Day 2025, UWOCASO, in partnership with Health Restoration Uganda and Faith Equals Works, conducted community outreaches in Bujagali Jinja, Kigoogwa Matugga Wakiso, and Lake Lunoni landing site in Gomba districts to raise awareness on cancer prevention, early detection, and treatment.

OUTREACH IMPACT:

- 512 people served: 350 women | 92 men | 70 children
- 20 women referred for further cancer screening
- Survivor testimonies shared to educate and inspire
- Breast self-examination training provided for early detection

KEY FINDINGS:

- Cancer is widely perceived as untreatable in the community
- Limited knowledge of risk factors, early signs, and referral pathways
- Of 12 Village Health Teams (VHTs)

INTERVIEWED:

- o None had formal cancer training
- o 7 had never undergone cancer screening
- o 5 believed cancer is not treatable

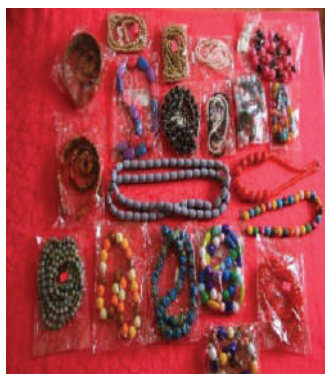




SHOP FOR HER TO SAVE LIFE

PINK INITIATIVE

Wearing a pink ribbon is a reminder for a Breast Self-Examination (BSE) or for a breast clinical examination. The Pink initiative reminds everybody about breast cancer, provides information on early diagnosis and gives hope to breast cancer patients, survivors and their families. More than fifty million Uganda shillings(50M) has been raised from this initiative and over one million women have benefited from awareness talks, survivor stories and over 500 patients directly benefit from counselling services, giving hope and reducing stigma

All this is possible through sale of pink ribbons and pink events. This initiative not only hosts annual events but is celebrated throughout October breast cancer awareness month by survivors, friends, staff of corporate institutions, authorities, schools, and social clubs where 60% of proceeds are used to support community outreaches and 40% redeemed to development of a home of hope.
